Nesika Work Parties Notice					

We have been provided a limited permit to enter closed forest service land. We are restricted to go in as a group and come out as a group. No hiking is permitted outside of our property on these work trips.

We will meet people at the gate on Larch MT road at 9:00 AM on Friday and Saturday mornings to take people in. We only bring people out at 6:00 PM on Saturday and 1:00 PM on Sunday. You can't use your Nesika key to open the gate.

The road past the green gate is narrow and only high clearance vehicles with four wheel drive are able to drive in. You may need to park at the Green gate and hike or ride in from there. Be prepared.

This work trip is limited to 30 people to help the cook, clean up the fire debris, cut, split and haul wood. Please sign up (on Meetup) to put yourself on the wait list so we can communicate with you to see where you want to work and when you want to come in. We will try to bring everyone who wants to come in and work.

Bring gloves and clothes that can get dirty. To stay overnight, bring sleeping bag, bed pad, and tent (optional). Shower is not yet working because of low water pressure till we get our new water tank in. Sponge baths are possible.

We can provide masks, helmets and some paint suits to work in the ash. Please bring leather gloves to protect your hands from broken glass. No children please. We need splitting mauls, wedges and axes for use or donation.

Mazamas Mountaineering Center (MMC): is a common meeting place for Board meetings and other administrative functions. It is located at 527 SE 43rd Avenue, one block south of Stark St.

Rose Villa: 13505 SE River Rd, Milwaukie, OR 97222, is a common place for club meetings Adventures and Travels meets in the Rec Hall, Fireside Room. Parking on Shroeder Lane, off of Courtney Rd by River Rd. Park before end of road, walk to multiple garage buildings on right, turn right, walk down ramp to your right. It is a yellow building, with a central arch on top, visible from River Rd.

Follow Treasure House signs. Map of Rose Villa, follow route C or B to the Recreation Hall (Treasure House signs)

Target: is a common westside meeting place for hikes. Exit US 26 at NW 185th Ave and drive south to Evergreen Pkwy turn east (left) one block to NW Town Center Dr., Park and meet on the west side of Target's parking lot across from Starbucks Coffee. Tri Met bus service on routes 47, 52 and 89 is nearby.

Tryon Creek State Park: sometimes used for Wed. AM (and other) hikes. From I-5 South: Take Terwilliger Blvd. exit, bear right, heading south past Taylor's Ferry Rd. and bear left at split to Boone's Ferry Rd, right at second roundabout exit, staying on Terwilliger. Park entrance is a right about one mile past the roundabout. Park near Nature Center.

President's Message

Dear TCO members,

You may have read the notice about concerned TCO members in the last Blazer. I want to assure you that the board of TCO works diligently to keep TCO functioning. The board makes decisions regarding membership, funding, events, and our lodges. The board are all elected volunteers. They meet monthly, answer emails and attend yearly events as volunteers.

In a club our size, there will always be differences of opinion. That is why voting is necessary. Though the board often comes to a consensus on many issues, the membership will nearly always have differing opinions. Any board decision will likely please most but not all members. We base our decisions on what is best for the club. The club president does not have a vote on any board decisions. The president runs the meetings and may replace certain (non-board) positions with board approval. The vice president, social chair, secretary, treasurer, membership chair and lodge chairs participate in voting.

Our club is over 100 years old. Certainly there have been changes in the way the club functions over the years. There will always be changes. Over the last 8 years or so many members have noted issues we are trying to correct. First is lack of new members. Our old way of members inviting friends to the club resulted in decreased membership as the club membership aged. Therefore we have been experimenting with new ways of attracting members who still have the drive and ability to participate in the outdoor events and take care of the lodge.

The second tough issue is handling funds. Before I and other new board members started in January, the previous boards had made decisions to keep a certain amount of funds in investments and not to drain the bank account. This was a good decision. We have been adhering to these decisions although this limits the amount of funding certain parts of the club can ask for. The good news is we are in good financial standing and we have not cut any events or hindered lodge function due to funding.

If you have a concern, please email me or any other board member. I reply to all emails personally. It is best not to go through another person to voice your opinion or request. If there is a concern that many support, this will likely be addressed in the next board meeting and potentially result in club changes. Most recently we eliminated hike fees for members and changed the allowed guest number for overnight stays at the lodges. These were items asked for by members.

Piggy backing on that thought, George Milne mentioned to me his observation of how Senior, Summer and Family Outings have kind of morphed into this outing Vicki Wood has organized at Belknap Hot Springs for the last 14 years. The advantage of this location is the ability to offer a variety of lodging ranging from upscale rental cabins to tenting and RV parking. The McKenzie River National Recreation Trail offers many recreational possibilities including: hiking, biking, rafting and cultural interpretive sites such as Fish Lake.

What started with Vicki's vision of a "simple" Outing at Belknap, Friday evening to Sunday morning (4 group meals: Friday dinner potluck, Sat breakfast, Sat dinner and Sun breakfast), has expanded to club members arriving ahead of the Outing and remaining days afterward. Most labor intensive for Vicki is club registrations, organizing food prep, being a liaison for all the accommodations she reserves, along with managing the details of an equitable chore list for the group gatherings and being leader of the advertised hike.
