Meeting Places

Friendly House NW Thurman and 26th. TriMet bus service on routes 15, 17 and 77 is nearby.

Gateway TCO : From I-205: take the Glisan Street exit, head east to 99th Ave, turn north, head a couple blocks and park in the Park and Ride garage. Meet at the SE corner of the structure (near the stairs) on the sidewalk (directly inside if it is raining). From I-84: take I-205, take the above exit and instructions

Target: A common westside meeting place for hikes. Exit US 26 at NW 185th Ave, drive south to Evergreen Parkway turn east (left) one block to NW Town Center Dr. Park and meet on the west side of the Target parking lot across from Starbucks Coffee. Tri Met bus service on routes 47, 52 and 89 is nearby.

Tryon Creek State Park: Sometimes used for Wed. AM (and other) hikes. From I-5 South: Take Terwilliger Blvd. exit, bear right, heading south past Taylor's Ferry Rd. and bear left at at Boone's Ferry Rd split. Right at second roundabout exit, staying on Terwilliger. Park entrance is a right about one mile past the roundabout. Park near the Nature Center.

4. Nesika, Glen reported

Thanks to Eric Zimmerman for brushing and clearing the road last Saturday. He said the buildings looked good. Costco had some cots on sale. Glen bought a couple to try at \$49.47 each. He will donate these 2 to the Club and pick up about 6 more.

5. Tyee, Paul reported

A very successful "committee" and interested parties discussed ideas on 2/12. Many were accepted and some rejected. It occurred to us that COVID rules had created two co-ed dorms and if this situation remains, then going forward more privacy is needed. So without removing any bunks, it was agreed upon that two separate private "rooms" could be created in women's (west) side and one in men's (east) side by the use of 7ft drapes. Other lower single bunks will have 3ft curtains for privacy. It was also agreed that no bunks will be painted. We discovered no dorm walls are insulated except one, the one facing the dining room. Work will start on insulating next month. We will also need to weatherproof the dorm doors. The lighting in the dorms will be upgraded with LED circuits and dimmer switches. We're still working on the logistics of it.

The host or group leader may designate male and female dorms for their time at the lodge. We're looking forward to moving Tyee forward in the next year without touching its loved, admired rustic looks.

The lodge has been busy almost every day this last month.

- Trips, Crisse reported It was a slow month: 2 day hikes, a planning meeting, and a snowshoe.
- 7. Social, Julia reported

A Social Planning Meeting was held via Zoom on 3/3/22. There are a total of 10 TCO members who have expressed interest in supporting Social Events this year. Most of the planning meeting focused on the Annual Banquet scheduled on 5/15/22. Time was also spent discussing the 4/9/22 Cape Horn Conservancy Day events that will include trail maintenance work, a community lunch and hikes. The Kids Friendly Social Event for 2/27/22 was cancelled due to lack of attendees. The dates of the Hike and Dines to be hosted at the lodges are on the TCO calendar. 8. President reported on old business

History Report, Linda Conrad

We discussed what paper minutes we need to keep. Joel has hard copies of Blazers to give to the History Committee. Linda is trying to correct membership addresses and eliminate those who have died. She has communicated with Joel about errors on the website. The lodge chair material given to Paul Cutter was over 10 years old; Linda threw some away and made up 2 notebooks of current information and forms. She printed off the whole directory and placed it in a notebook for him. She organized all the appliance guidelines, furnace, water reports, etc in notebooks. She will start putting together a collage as soon as she can get to Nesika to get the Tyee pictures.

New Business:

- Trip Fees, Jennifer Samuels
 There has been confusion about fees for hiking and backpacking.

 Moved, seconded and unanimously approved the following fee structure:
 - Day hikes and backpack trips are free for members
 - Day hikes are \$2 for non-members
 - Backpack trips are \$2 per day for nonmembers

We will change information on the website to be consistent with the above vote. We may need to vote on a bylaw change to make outings free for members.

2. Redefining Covid 19 guidelines for lodge use. We will follow Multnomah County's guidelines as they become available. In the meantime, the use of pods, masks, and vaccination status is up to the host to choose and post for their time slots. The host has the discretion to post more restrictive requirements. Unvaccinated persons should protect themselves by maintaining space, washing hands, masking. Any personal health concerns are up to each individual. The lodges will have a posting in the buildings instructing guests to check with host for current guidelines.

- 3. Sheryl Wagner proposed reduced fees for special families. We moved, seconded and unanimously approved to waive lodge and trip fees for foster families retroactive to the first of 2022. We will adjust the lodge and trip fees schedules to reflect this vote.
- 4. Board members present at the annual banquet will briefly introduce themselves: how we became involved in TCO and our goals/ intentions for the year.
- 5. Conservation Chair, Candace Bonner, feels she can't adequately continue in this position. She is willing, however, to continue until we find a replacement. The Board appreciates the work that Candace has done in her role as Conservation Chair.

Conservation Notes

Candace Bonner, TCO Conservation Chair

Following are some of the current conservation actions going on in Oregon: Many of us have been fighting for improved riparian protections for decades without any significant results. This year the Private Forest Accord (PFA) was reached between industrial timber and a coalition of environmental groups. This will finally bring real change to how we treat our streams and protect riparian habitat. Senate Bills 1501 and 1502 are on the floor now, with bipartisan support, embodying these changes. The PFA will also require extensive and much needed revision of the Oregon Forest Practices Act (OFPA). This is a real sea change in how we treat our private forest lands and protect our waters. Oregon has added new members to its Board of Forestry (BOF) and has a new State Forester. I have had the opportunity as part of the MCAT forestry group to interview the BOF members and new State Forester. There has been a positive shift in climate change awareness and commitment to climate action. (Note: The PFA has just passed this month!)

The Elliot State Forest may finally be decoupled from county payments and become a research forest, preserving much of its old growth. SB 1546 is now on the senate floor.

The Natural and Working Lands bill SB 1534A is also on the floor. This would provide incentives for better stewardship of natural and working lands, to increase carbon sequestration.

This year DEQ and ODF have developed climate action plans. ODF had its Climate Change and Carbon Plan (CCCP) approved by the Board of Forestry. DEQ has a new Climate Protection Program (CPP) starting this year. All the climate and conservation related plans and bills have had opportunity for public comment, public efforts to improve and mold them, and opportunities for organizations to sign on to support or oppose plans and bills. Reminders

For activities such as bicycle, snowshoe, and XC skiing check with the leaders for the difficulty level. Good equipment for the specific activity is required for all events. For hikes, snowshoes:

Class A - Shorter, less strenuous activity, typically 4 to 8 miles, less than 1500 feet elevation gain.

Class B - Moderate to difficult, typically 6 to 12 miles, up to 3000 feet of elevation gain.

Class C - Long and difficult, strong experienced participants only, typically over 8 miles, and over 3000 feet of elevation gain. Boots are recommended for B/C hikes.

Harsh or unusual conditions may greatly increase the exertion and skill required. Be prepared for the level of activity you are planning to take. Contact the trip leader if you have any questions and to let him or her know that you will be attending. Bring plenty of water and a sack lunch. Please, no alcohol. Remember to bring your Ten Essentials. Pets allowed on designated trips only.

Stay with the group and follow the leader. The leader is responsible for the group's safety. The leader determines which route is taken. The leader has authority to determine if a participant is prepared for the activity. Group safety must come first.

Fees

There is no charge to Trails Club members for day activities; nonmembers pay \$2. Please contribute to any carpooling expenses at the rate of \$.15 per mile. With multiple riders the driver can collect up to \$.30 per mile shared by all the riders. Other fees may apply. If you have RSVP'd for an activity at a lodge involving food expense and are unable to participate, you are obligated to do one of the following: Cancel before the food is purchased, find someone to take your place, or pay for your share of the food.

All activities must be approved by the appropriate activity Coordinator or the Trips Trustee.
